There is increasing acknowledgment of a misalignment between research and clinical practice in psychology. Research pools are selectively screened to exclude participants with potentially confounding medical or psychological comorbidities, but these "super clean" samples are not representative of real-world clinical contexts. This makes a sizable portion of scientific results nonapplicable to actual patients, and arguably defeats the purpose of conducting research in the first place. This article addresses this issue with a perspective on the Alzheimer's and dementia field, and argues that research studies going forward must consider the presence of widespread psychiatric comorbidities in participants with, or at risk for, neurodegenerative disease. Chronic mental illness is a strong risk factor for dementia, but very little is known about how psychiatric and neurodegenerative diseases might interact, or how dementia presents in the context of a preexisting illness, because psychiatric conditions are systematic exclusion criteria from studies of dementia.
