Course Calendar Statement:

An introductory exploration of the cultures of China, Japan, and Korea that outlines their shared characteristics as well as highlighting their differences. Subjects covered include physical environment, history, philosophy, social and political order, economy, and arts.

Course Hours: 3 units; (3-0)

Course description

This is an introductory course on the cultures of China, Japan, Korea, and Vietnam that outlines their shared characteristics as well as highlighting differences. The geography, history, philosophy/religion, social, political, economic and art will be presented in a survey format.

Prerequisites: None

Online course:

Class activities will take place during the Zoom meetings in real-time (synchronous). There are class discussions used for evaluation and class tests are distributed during class time. Students have videos assignments as well as readings each week.

Course Learning Outcomes:

The student will be introduced to multidimensional aspects of E. Asian culture, important facts, movements and foundational ideas that have shaped this region. Students will be exposed to modern scholarly methodologies. Critical analysis and interpretations of evidence will play a central role.



ASSESSMENT

There will be five short tests in this course. The test will be posted during class times on test day at the D2L site. The tests are in home open book and should be returned within 24 hours.

Each unit has several videos assigned. Students are required to watch all videos listed and write a one paragraph summary on each video (total no more than one page per unit). Your summary should include the titles and the run time for each. Deadlines are posted in the class schedule on D2L.

There will also be a discussion for each unit. Discussion participants will receive participation point. Dates are posted in the class schedule on D2L.

The total number of points for the course is 100. [See below for details]. Students should email the professor ASAP if a) missed deadline, b) issues arise during the test time, c) illness or other issues impact your study or d) you need accommodations. Arrangements can be made according to the needs of the student.
