COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Overview of the role of law in society. Examination of different concepts of law. Study of legal rules, institutions, processes and personnel in social context. Discussion of construction and exercise of the power of law. Emphasis on Canadian law and legal system.

Written assignment:

The written assignment will be a short five to eight page term paper graded in part on the quality of the writing. Details of the assignment will be distributed separately.

Late papers will be penalized five points per day late. Papers late by more than seven (7) days will receive a zero grade.

Mid-term examination:

A one-hour mid-term exam will be held in class on *February 10*. Further details about the issues to be covered and the grading rubric will be provided in class. The exam will be closed book. Part of the grading will be based on the quality of the writing.

Final examination:

A two-hour final exam will be held *as scheduled by the Registrar*. Further details about the issues to be covered and the grading rubric will be provided in class. The exam will be closed book. Part of the grading will be based on the quality of the writing.

Grade reappraisals:

Up to one week after an exam or assignment is returned, a student may seek a reappraisal of the grade from the instructor. To do so, the student must submit a written request briefly explaining the grounds for the reappraisal. Note, a reappraisal may raise, lower or confirm the grade originally assigned.

INSTRUCTOR GUIDELINES:

Absence From Mid Term Examination:

Students who are absent from the mid term examination for legitimate reasons (e.g. illness with the appropriate documentation) are responsible for contacting the instructor via email within 48 hours of the missed test to discuss alternative arrangements. A copy of this email may be requested as proof of the attempt to contact the instructor. Any student who fails to do so forfeits the right to a makeup test.

Deferral of Final Examination:

Deferral of a final examination can be granted for reasons of illness, domestic affliction, and unforeseen circumstances, as well as to those with three (3) final exams scheduled within a 24-hour period. Deferred final exams will not be granted to those who sit the exam, who have made travel arrangements that conflict with their exam, or who have misread the examination timetable. The decision to allow a deferred final exam rests not with the instructor but with Enrolment Services. Instructors should, however, be notified if you will be absent during the examination. Appeals:

If a student has a concern about the course or a grade they have been assigned, they must first

FOIP legislation requires that instructors maintain the confidentiality of student information. In practice, this means that student assignment and tests cannot be left for collection in any public place without the consent of the student. It also means that grades cannot be distributed via email. Final exams are kept by instructors but can be viewed by contacting them or the main office in the Department of Sociology. If students are unable to collect their assignments from the instructor in person they may provide a stamped, self-address envelope to the instructor. Any uncollected assignments and tests will be destroyed after three months; final examinations are destroyed after one year.
