Course Description

This course examines the conceptions of rights and freedoms in the liberal tradition, beginning with J.S. Mill and other early writers and moving on to discuss the critiques and new directions that have been put forward by more recent scholars. We examine the implications of these theories for contemporary socio-legal problems around such issues as expression, religion and multiculturalism.

Objectives of the Course

Students are to gain a detailed understanding of liberalism and its workings in Canada, with some comparisons to other jurisdictions. They will enhance their analytical skills and craft thoughtful, coherent, creative arguments about liberalism and its real-world manifestations.

Textbooks and Readings:

Edited versions of cases will be available on Blackboard, as will links to other materials. The following books will be used:

- John Stuart Mill, *On Liberty* (1869) available on the internet, with links identified in Blackboard; some used copies will also be available at the bookstore
- Will Kymlicka, *Multicultural Citizenship: A Liberal Theory of Minority Rights* (Oxford UP, 1996) also available online through the library

Assignments and Evaluation

• Midterm: Mill, Berlin and liberty (30%) – Thurs. Oct. 11 (closed book)

- Debate / analysis (30%) Debates will take place on Oct. 16, Oct. 18, Nov. 1 and Nov. 6. Judgments will be due two weeks after the debates.
- Final exam (40%) registrar-scheduled final exam period (closed book)

Four class sessions will be devoted to debates. Every student will be involved in one debate. Each debate team will be composed of four students, two of whom will deliver the arguments orally and the other two of whom will jointly prepare a written argument for their team. These written arguments will be due by 9:30 am the day of the debate in electronic form and will be posted to the Blackboard site.

Students not on debate teams will be judges, with one-quarter of these non-participant students being judges for each of the debates. Judgments will be due by 4 pm two weeks after each debate. Judgments will be based on both oral and written argument. Students may collaborate in composing their judgments and may submit judgments individually, in pairs, or in groups of three. Judgments will be posted to the Blackboard site so as to provide feedback to the debate teams.

The grade for the course and whether or not a student passes it will be based on the student's accumulated score and will not depend on passing any particular component of the course.

It is the student's responsibility to keep a copy of each submitted assignment. Note: Please hand in your essays directly to your tutor or instructor if possible. If it is not possible to do so, a daytime drop box is available in SS110; a date stamp is provided for your use. A night drop box is also available for after-hours submission. Assignments will be removed the following morning, stamped with the previous day's date, and placed in the instructor's mailbox.
