Course Description

Introduction to Women's Studies (from the Academic Calendar description) An introduction to academic feminism that critically deconstructs cultural notions of sex, gender, race, class and other social stratifiers; discusses contemporary and classical feminist perspectives; and examines feminist work and activism.

By the end of this course, students should be able to:

- 1. Explain the formation of the academic field of Women's Studies in North America
- 2. Identify and apply various foundational feminist theories.
- 3. Recognize the importance of analyzing gender, race, class, sexuality and other social stratifiers from an intersectional framework.
- 4. Describe historical and contemporary issues facing primarily Canadian women.
- **5.** Give examples of feminist activism.
