Course description	This course is designed to introduce the general university student to the life, music, and wider significance of one of the most beloved composers of all time: Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart. The center of the course is the music of Mozart and provides a consideration of his mature instrumental and operatic masterpieces, as well as some earlier works. The intent is to provide both an overview of Mozart's development as a composer and a discussion of a representative selection of his music. This musical core will be elaborated through an account of Mozart's life, the cultural context in which he wrote his music, and a discussion of Mozart as the mythic embodiment of the idea of "musical genius." In this respect, the course will include a consideration of Peter Schaffer's play <i>Amadeus</i> and its much-acclaimed movie version.
Course learning outcomes	By the completion of this course, successful students will: <ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Have a good overview knowledge of the biography of Mozart. 2. Have a listening knowledge of major works by Mozart. 3. Have an introduction to the history and culture of Europe during the period under study (1760-1800). 4. Have a knowledge of the myths and legends surrounding Mozart and his music.
Course schedule	Aside from lectures, there will be three evaluation components: two tests and the final examination.
