Course description	<p>The course will offer the student a guided study of the music, history, and culture of Europe and North America between the years (approximately) 1900 A.D. to 2000 A.D. Central to the course will be the musical (listening) selections that will trace the development of musical style during these years. The course content will focus upon the meaning and artistic substance of such important period style terms as the modernism, serialism, neoclassicism, and the avant garde, together with a consideration of the major composers writing in these styles. A detailed list of the works to be studied (related to the readings from the text together with musical works contained in the accompanying anthology) will be provided in the detailed course syllabus.</p> <p>The course will consist of a series of 3 study "units" each concluding with a test or the final examination. The tests and exam will focus upon the readings from the text and the listening examples. (See details below.)</p>
Course learning outcomes	<p>By the completion of this course, successful students will:</p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Have a knowledge of a selected repertoire of music during the 20th century.</li> <li>2. Have a knowledge of the basic facts of European and North American social and political history during the same period.</li> <li>3. Understand the basic principles of composition that inform Western musical culture from 1900 to 2000 A.D.</li> <li>4. Have a listening knowledge of the different styles that together define Western classical music from 1900 to 2000. A.D.</li> </ol>
Course schedule	<p>Together with the lectures, the course will include two tests plus a final examination and an historical/analytical term paper.
