MASTER OF FINE ARTS IN DRAMA

The MFA in Drama lives within the dynamic School of Creative and Performing Arts. Applicants can specialize in Design/Technical, Directing, Interdisciplinary Creation and Research, Playwriting, or Theatre Studies. In each of these areas, students receive expert instruction and supervision from some of Canada's most recognized scholars, artists, and artist/scholars. Students enjoy high levels of agency within a carefully structured framework as they determine their individual program designs and thesis subjects. The program complements discipline-specific preparation with unique opportunities for interdisciplinary instruction and experience within the school.

Graduate students often engage with our performance season and our festival of student work, which supports a wide range of audience relationships. Facilities include graduate student offices, design, and costume shops, three thoroughly equipped and staffed theatre spaces (ranging from 150 through 500 seats), and a fourth studio theatre dedicated to faculty and graduate student research.

SECTION II – PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS / SPECIALIZATIONS

Drama's graduate program specializes in directing, playwriting, design/technical, theatre studies and interdisciplinary creation and research. DIRECTED STUDIES

To gain credit for a special project that does not fall under an assigned course name you can apply for a Directed Study credit. You must have a faculty member who will supervise you. Completed forms must be submitted to scpa@ucalgary.ca by the end of the first week of lectures. View the Graduate resources for more details on directed studies.

SECTION III – SUPERVISORY ARRANGEMENTS

Supervisory arrangements in the SCPA, Drama Division are based on the Faculty of <u>Graduate Studies supervisory</u> <u>regulations</u>.

Students will be assigned an interim supervisor to start with and must discuss and declare their supervisor of record within 8 months of starting the program (usually by mid-April for September starts).

The student and their supervisor of record must complete a <u>supervisory checklist</u> to adjust their expectations to one another. They will also be asked to fill in a progress plan, outlining the student's individual thesis milestones and committing to them.

SECTION IV – EVALUATION PROCEDURES AND STANDARDS

ANNUAL PROGRESS REPORT

Once per year each student must complete an Annual Progress Report (APR). The Faculty of Graduate Studies will email the student the on-line form on the first business day of May. The student must complete their portion of the form before May 15th, after which it is forwarded to the Supervisor and Co-Supervisor (if applicable) before the Graduate Program Director signs off. The student will receive an online copy of the report after the Supervisor and the Graduate Program Director have completed their sections and will acknowledge the final APR.

ANNUAL REGISTRATION INITIALIZATION

Every year, after your first year and before your annual registration term (in most cases September 1st) students must complete the registration initialization in their Student Centre. This allows for continued course registration and, if you have completed course work, it updates your file to confirm you are continuing your studies and/or thesis work. At the same time, we ask all students to ensure that we have your current email, phone number, and mailing address, along with your emergency contact information.

DEGREE AUDITS

It is recommended that before the last term of your courses you make an appointment with the Graduate Program Advisor for a degree audit, ensuring you have completed all necessary course work and understand the necessary steps to complete your degree.

DEADLINE DATES

Graduate students should be aware of all deadline dates as listed in the current Calendar.

Drama requires all students who have submitted their thesis to the vault/prism to produce one bound copy of their thesis to Drama for archival purposes.

SECTION VI – FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE & TEACHING OPPORTUNITIES

Full-time students registered in a graduate degree program at the University of Calgary are eligible for awards and financial assistance. All students who are eligible for awards are required to apply. Scholarship information, application forms and instructions are found on the graduate award website and through the searchable awards database at grad.ucalgary.ca/awards. In addition to internal university awards, awards are available through external agencies and Canadian and international governments. If you are an international student, check with your home government for funding options.

There are also several funding opportunities available for <u>Indigenous graduate applicants</u> available through the Faculty of Graduate Studies.

Students should research awards in the graduate calendar and the <u>Graduate Students' Association</u> for eligibility requirements.

Many graduate students receive funding from the Division through <u>Graduate Assistantships</u>, either teaching (GAT) or non-teaching (GANT) positions. All aspects of graduate assistantships are based on a <u>Collective Agreement</u> between the Governors of the University of Calgary and the Graduate Students' Association.

Government student assistance programs (student loans) are also available to Canadian citizens, permanent residents, protected persons, and American citizens. Please see <u>student loans</u> for more details.

SECTION VII - FACILITIES

Visit <u>ucalgary.ca/map</u> for a campus map or to use the interactive room finder. Rooms on campus use the first two or three letters to designate the building and the number to designate the room. A room with a number in the 100s is on the main floor, in the 200s is on the second floor and a room such as 004 or 012 is in the basement. For example: the main office for the SCPA is CHD 100. It's located on the main floor of Craigie Hall, Block D.

Studios, Classrooms & Performance spaces

Rehearsal studios for Dance, Drama, and Music are in Craigie Hall in blocks D, E and F and vary in size from small practice rooms to large studios. The majority of classes in the SCPA are taught in Craigie Hall in blocks D, E and F with a few lecture classes booked in campus lecture halls and large dance classes hosted in Kinesiology. The SCPA has several performance spaces that support our work. These spaces are all close or connected to Craigie Hall and can be found in the creative block, which includes the Rozsa Centre, The F.R. Matthews (CHF101), Joyce and Quentin Doolittle (CHF206), Reeve, and University Theatres as well as several other smaller performance spaces.

Graduate Student office assignments

All graduate students are assigned offices. Keys and room numbers will be assigned and provided to each student in August/September by the Administrative Assistant located in Craigie Hall CHD 100. It is your responsibility to keep your office clean and safe during the time you are assigned the space. Please do not leave food or drinks in your office or decorate in any way that can damage the office or create a fire hazard.

Integrated Arts Media Labs

The Integrated Arts Media Labs (IAML) are a dedicated digital arts education and production environment located on the 6th floor of the Art Building (Parkade), created specifically for students in the Department of Art and Art History (DAAH), Dance, Drama, and Music. The IAML consists of the Main Lab (AB 659, 22 stations) and the Small Lab (AB 605, 10 stations). Each station is equipped with a Mac computer, MIDI keyboard, and a color-calibrated display(s). It offers a full range of creative software, including video editing, 2D graphics and animation, 3D modeling and animation, CAD, music/audio sequencing, music notation, and interaction design and authoring. Equipment for short-term loan (e.g., audio recorder, DSLR) and printing services are also available for DAAH and SCPA students.

University Theatre Services

<u>University Theatre Services</u> (UTS) is a support service unit within the SCPA whose primary function is to support the academic programs of the SCPA. UTS also provides a wide variety of production, publicity, box-office and management support services to all users of the University Theatre, the Reeve Theatre, and the Rozsa Centre, including the Eckhardt-Gramatté Hall, the Boris Roubakine Recital Hall, and the Mezzanine Gallery, for both oncampus and off-campus customers. UTS offices are in Craigie Hall D Block.

A place for meeting and study, The Taylor Family Digital Library (TFDL) is located in the heart of campus and resources include physical materials, electronic equipment for use and loan, and the <u>Glenbow Western Research Centre</u>. Services and support are available including <u>workshops</u>, resources from <u>Research Data Management</u>, <u>Open Services</u> and the <u>Copyright Office</u>, as well as individual research consultations and class instruction from your subject librarian.
