In this article, we present an introduction and overview for a two-part special issue series focused on embedding equity into school mental health through theory, research, and practice. The papers in Part 1 of the special issue series cover critical topics for advancing equitable school mental health, including the centering of community and youth perspectives; a focus on reducing disproportionality in discipline practices; and details on equity-focused interventions. In Part 2, papers focus on integrating race and racial equity into school mental health frameworks; integrating a racial equity lens into trauma-informed school practices; addressing outcomes that have disproportionate impacts on youth of color; and exploring domains of injustice and oppression beyond racial inequity. We hope that the topics discussed in this special issue series move us towards providing equitable and just school mental health services for all children and youth.

Cognitive Science Seminars (CSS)

The Cognitive Science Seminars (CSS) is a series of talks given by trainees and faculty in cognitive psychology where we share our current work, practice presentations, and discuss issues in the field.

Our final session is **April 22nd at 9:00 am. Studying network variants with EEG.** Presented by **Michael McCarthy**

The study of network variants—individual-specific deviations in whole brain functional network organization—is an area of growing interest in human neuroscience due to its relevance for understanding how much and in which ways whole brain functional networks differ between and within individuals. Previous research has used highly sampled functional



magnetic resonance imaging (fMRI) data to study network variants, creating a considerable practical barrier due to the cost of this work. Michael's research explores the feasibility of using electroencephalography (EEG) to study network variants. In CSS, we will discuss some of the challenges of this work, and the preliminarily examination of how whole brain functional networks differ between and within individuals using EEG sensor space functional connectivity analysis as well as measures of network similarity.
